Joseph J. Reichenberger, age 88 of Waukau, passed away Monday morning, December 1, 2008 in the Webster Manor in Omro. On December 18, 1919, he was born in Oshkosh the son of Henry and Ida (Kotschell) Reichenberger. At a time Joe worked for Oshkosh B'gosh. For 25 years he worked for the City of Oshkosh. He was a former member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Oshkosh and was presently a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Omro. During World War II he served with the U.S. Army. As a hobby he enjoyed doing crafts. Joe was a kind and giving person and was deeply religious.
